

COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT 2021



Purpose of a Community Health Needs Assessment

A community health assessment identifies the key health needs and issues within a community through systematic, comprehensive data collection and analysis. Hospitals along with key community stakeholders collaborate to develop a community roadmap using reliable data gathered through primary and secondary sources. This roadmap then drives the community's improvement plans and activities over the course of the next three years.

What is a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA)?

It is a strategic plan that must be completed at least once every three years by every registered 501(c)3 hospital. The purpose of the assessment is to better understand the current health needs of residents in the hospitals service area and to help identify and prioritize where and how improvements can be made. The hospital's CHNA is a collaboration with the community health department and other community health providers and interested stakeholders. The requirements include the following:

- A description of the community served by the hospital Analysis of quantitative health care issues data for the community served.
- Analysis of quantitative health care issues data for the community served. The Community
 Assessment Team started meeting regularly starting November 3, 2020 to analyze quantitative
 data.
- The issuance of a community health needs assessment survey. The survey was created and made available to county residents on January 4, 2021. Data was collected for a 6-week period.
- A review of current efforts to address the health care issues of the community based on the survey and quantitative data. Quantitative and survey data was collected, compiled, and reviewed once the survey closed-up until the townhall meeting was held in April 2021.
- Townhall meeting to collaborate with the community to formulate a 3-year action plan. The quantitative and survey information was shared with key community stakeholders in the townhall meeting on April 28, 2021. The group discussed the secondary data collected as well as the survey results. The group identified strengths and weaknesses in the community and developed a priority list of improvements that need to be addressed. With a list in hand we can then strategize ways to improve and overcome these challenges moving forward.

Regulations

- Benchmark progress annually on the non-profit Form 990 informational return.
- \$50,000 fine for each year the hospital is out of compliance.
- The hospital is required to make the CHNA "widely available to the public" by posting it on their website.



Community Description

For the purpose of this assessment the target area is Barton County. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 901 square miles, of which 895 square miles is land and 5.2 is water. The geographic center of Kansas is also located in Barton County.

As of 2019, the county population was 25,779. The county was founded in 1872 and the county seat is Great Bend. The county is named in honor of Clara Barton, responsible for the founding of the American Red Cross. Cities residing in Barton County include, Great Bend, Hoisington, Ellinwood, Claflin, Pawnee Rock, Olmitz and Albert. Barton County is the site of Barton County Community College (1965), the SRCA State Historical Drag Strip and Cheyenne Bottoms Wildlife Area the largest marsh in the interior of the United States. The area is critical habitat for several threatened and endangered species, including the whooping crane, bald eagle, peregrine falcon, least tern, and piping plover.


Uninsured percentages dropped to 14.1% in Barton County, however they remain higher than the State of Kansas at 12.0%.

HEALTH OUTCOMES

The 2020 Health outcomes map. Barton (BT) ranks 56 out of 104 counties. These rankings measures both the length and quality of life in the county.

The map below is divided into four quartiles with less color intensity indicating better health outcomes in the respective summary rankings. Counties are ordered by the health outcome rank, with a topranked county (rank=1) having the best health outcome score.



Health outcomes measures - Quality of Life

17% of Adults in Barton County reported that they had fair or poor health. That compares to Johnson County who scored the best at 9% and Wyandotte who scored the worst at 23%.


The average number of physically unhealthy days reported in the past 30 days was 3.7 days. That compares to Johnson County who scored the best at 2.5 days and Wyandotte who scored the worst at 4.3 days.

The average number of mentally unhealthy days reported in the past 30 days was 3.8 days. That compares to Johnson County who scored the best at 2.9 days and Crawford who scored the worst at 4.2 days.

HEALTH FACTORS

The 2020 Health outcomes map. Barton (BT) ranks 86 out of 104 counties. These rankings represent the things we can change to improve health for all, like opportunities for quality education, good paying jobs, access to quality clinical care, healthy foods, green spaces, and securable and affordable housing. Four health factor areas are measured: Health Behaviors (tobacco use, diet & exercise, alcohol & drug use and sexual activity), Clinical Care: (access to care, quality of care), Social and Economic Factors (education, employment & income, family & social support and community safety), Physical Environment (air & water quality, housing & transit).

The map below is divided into four quartiles with less color intensity indicating better health outcomes in the respective summary rankings. Counties are ordered by the health outcome rank, with a topranked county (rank=1) having the best health outcome score.



39% of the adult population in Barton County report a body mass index (BMI) greater than or equal to 30 which is considered obese. 25 - 29.9 is overweight, 18.5 - 25 is Normal. That compares to Sheridan who scored the best at 24%.

28% of adults age 20 and over report they are not physically active at all. That compares to Wilson County who scored the worst at 38% and Riley and Douglas counties who scored the best at 17%.

Top Community Issues Identified by the committee based on the quantitative data

Heart Disease/Heart Attack - #1 & #3 causes of deaths in our community, #1 & #4 leading causes of hospital admissions and #6 risk factor for the Medicare population.

High Blood Pressure – #1 risk factor among both the Adult and Medicare populations and #3 chronic disease risk factor.

High Cholesterol - #2 & #3 risk factor for the Adult and Medicare populations and #4 chronic disease risk factor.

Cancer - #2 cause of deaths in our community

Physical Inactivity - #1 chronic disease risk factor

Overweight/Obesity - #2 and #5 risk chronic disease risk factors.

Pneumonia - #2 leading cause of hospital admissions

Immunizations - #2 risk factor of the Medicare population (PPV) and #4 for Infants

Mental Health - #4 risk factor among the Adult population and #3 leading cause of hospital admissions.






Prostate Cancer – 153.3: Except for skin cancer, prostate cancer is the most common cancer in American men.





HEART DISEASE/HEART ATTACK

Death Rate due to Heart Disease – Is the <u>number one cause of death</u> in the U.S. and Barton County. Physical inactivity and being overweight are considered cardiovascular risk determinants. Regular physical activity and a diet low in unhealthy fats and high in fruits and vegetables may help reduce the risk for cardiovascular disease.



Death Rate due to Heart Attack – Of the counties measured the lowest value is 27.2. Barton County ranked being the 3rd **worst** behind Johnson County at 176.7 and Crawford at 218.4. Educating those at risk and improved access to care can help improve outcomes and decrease mortality after a heart attack.




HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE


Is the leading cause of stroke and heart attacks. Nearly 1 in 3 adults have it and many are not aware they have it.

The risk for high blood pressure increases with obesity, diabetes, high salt intake, high stress levels, high alcohol intake, and tobacco use.

Hypertension: Medicare Population




HIGH CHOLESTEROL

Is one of the major risk factors for heart disease which is the leading cause of death among men and women in the United States as noted above. About 600,000 people die of heart disease in the United States every year. That is 1 in every 4 deaths.

Lowering cholesterol levels lessens the risk for developing heart disease and reduces the chance of having a heart attack. Though we have a long way to hit the HP 2020 Target of 13.5% we are trending down and lower than both the Kansas and US Averages.

High Cholesterol: Medicare Population




CANCER


Male Prostate Cancer – The most common diagnosed invasive cancer in Kansas and the 3rd leading cause of cancer death among men. Sadly little change over the years.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 60.9. Barton County ranked being the 14th **worst** behind Lane County who is the worst at a staggering 253.



Female Breast Cancer – Among women, the most common diagnosed invasive cancer in Kansas and the 2nd leading cause of cancer death. Sadly again very little change over the years.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 38.8 and the highest is 225.1.



Lung & Bronchus Cancer – Is the leading cause of cancer death and the second most common cancer among both men and women in the United States. The most important thing you can do to lower your risk is to quit smoking and avoid secondhand smoke. Again we have not made much improvement over the years.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 25.1 and the highest value is 106. Barton County is in the middle of the pack at 62.6.



Colorectal Cancer Rate – Is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer overall in the state. Risk increases with age. More than 90% of colorectal cancers occur in people age 50 and older. It is common for this cancer not to have symptoms, especially at first which is why regular screening test are important.



Of the counties measured the lowest value is 20.2 and the highest value is 79.4. Barton County's numbers have dropped over the years from our highest of 62.5 to 48.6.




PHYSICAL INACTIVITY

Adults doing enough Physical Activity - Only 1 in 5 adults in the U.S. meets recommendations for both aerobic exercise and muscle strengthening. Physically active adults reduce their risk of serious health conditions including obesity heart disease, diabetes, colon cancer and high blood pressure. 84.9% of Adults in Barton County do not meet the U.S. guidelines. This percentage increased 3.7% from the previous measurement period.



Of the counties measured the lowest value is Cloud County at 9.3% and the highest value is Jackson County at 31%. Barton County is the 8th WORST County at 15.1%.




OVERWEIGHT/OBESITY

Percent of Adults who are Overweight – Of the counties measured the lowest value is Atchison at 23.5% and the highest is Nemaha at 42.1%. Bartpm is the 3rd worst County at 38.5% and have trended upward the last two measurement periods.




Percent of Adults who are Obese – Barton Counties numbers look really-good. Of the counties measured the lowest value is Riley County at 23% and the highest is Jackson County at 47.6%. The fact that our obesity percentage dropped 13.9% from the previous period is an indicator why the overweight percentages above increased.




IMMUNIZATIONS


Percent of Infants Fully Immunized at 24 Months – Vaccine coverage is of great public health importance. By having greater vaccine coverage, there is an increase in herd immunity, which leads to lower disease incidence and an ability to limit the size of disease outbreaks.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 35.4% and the highest value is 96.4%. Barton County is doing pretty good at 77.2% but would like to get closer to the 96.4%.



Percent of Adults 65 Years and Older who were immunized against Influenza during the past 12 months - The flu can cause severe illness and life-threatening complications particularly in older people, young children, pregnant women, and people with certain health conditions. It can lead to pneumonia and can be dangerous for people with heart or breathing conditions. Our numbers have been trending down here instead of up. The lowest county measured is 39.4% and the highest is 70.4%.




Percent of Medicare Eligible Beneficiaries 65 plus Receiving Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine (PPV) – Pneumococcal disease kills more people in the United States than all other vaccine-preventable diseases combined, and the highest mortality occurs among the elderly and patients with underlying medical conditions. The lowest county measured 17.6% and the highest value is 75%. We have a lot of work here.



MENTAL HEALTH

Percent of Adults who were ever diagnosed with a depressive disorder – Depression affects almost 10% of the United States population aged 18 and older and is the cause of more than 2/3's of suicides each year. Barton County's numbers are non the rise from 14.7% in 2011 to 22% in 2017.




Suicide Mortality Rate – Depression and suicide are significant public issues. Depression is one of the most common mental disorders experienced by elders. Barton Counties numbers continue to trending upward showing a 10.97 increase over the last 16 years.



DIABETES


Percent of Adults with diagnosed diabetes – Diabetes is the 7th leading cause of death in the United States. Diabetes can have a harmful effect on most of the organ systems in the human body. Persons with diabetes are also at increased risk for heart disease neuropathy and stroke. Of the counties measured the lowest is 5.5% and the highest value is 18.4%.




Diabetes Hospital Admission Rate – The prevalence of diagnosed type 2 diabetes increased sixfold in the latter half of the last century according to the CDC. Diabetes risk factors such as obesity and physical inactivity have played a major role in the dramatic increase. Barton County's numbers here have increased steadily the last 4 years going from 9 to 18.



Diabetes: Medicare Population – Barton County has stayed the course on a very gradual incline. Seven years ago we measured at 26.2% to today we are at 28.2%.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 18.3% and the highest value is 32.8%.




DENTAL CARE

Percentage of Screened 3-12 Grade Students with no dental sealants - Of the counties measured the lowest value is 31.1% and the highest value is 100%.



Percentage of Screened K-12 Grade Students with obvious dental decay - Of the counties measured the lowest value is 3.9% and the highest value is 39.7%.




LIVING BELOW THE POVERTY LEVEL

Children Living Below the Poverty Level – Children in poverty are more likely to have behavioral and emotional problems. They also tend to exhibit cognitive difficulties, as shown in achievement test scores, and are less likely to complete basic education.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 1.1 and the highest is 32.4. Over the past 9 years this percentage has increased almost 10% going from 15.5% to 24.6%.




Free Lunch Program/Food Insecurity

Students Eligible for the Free Lunch Program – Barton County's numbers have gradually increased over the last 10 years going from 40% to 50%.




Child Food Insecurity Rate – Children who are food insecure are more likely to be hospitalized and may be at higher risk for developing chronic diseases such as obesity as a result in lower quality diet, anemia and asthma. In addition, food-insecure children may also be at higher risk for behavioral and social issues including fighting, hyperactivity, anxiety and bullying. Barton County's percentages have stayed very consistent over the last 7 years.



Food Insecurity Rate

Measures those who experience food insecurity at some point during the year. One in four Americans worries about having enough money to put food on the table in the next year. Food insecurity is associated with chronic health problems in adults including diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, hyperlipidemia, obesity and mental health issues including major depression.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 6.7% and the highest value is 17.7%. Barton County's numbers have slightly increased over the last 7 years going from 12.2% to 13.6%.



FOOD INSECURITY INDEX

Improving our community's access to food can improve other health and social outcomes, such as hospital readmissions, financial burdens for medication purchasing, and school readiness and attendance. Food insecurity is well known to be a strong correlate with other household and community measures of financial stress, such as Medicaid enrollment, SNAP enrollment, and mental health burden.







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
Food Insecurity was sighted as a key problem by the community. The 2020 Food Insecurity Index ranked Barton County's two largest populated areas as a 5 (high need).

Tobacco Use


Percent of Adults who currently smoke cigarettes – Approximately one-third of all tobacco users in this country will die prematurely because of their dependence on tobacco. Barton County has seen a slight downward trend, but a bigger reduction is needed.




Of the counties measured the lowest value is 11.1% and the highest value is 35.9%. Barton County is doing pretty good at 77.2% but would like to get closer to the 96.4%.



Percent of births where mother smoked during pregnancy – Smoking during pregnancy adversely affects the health of both the mother and her baby. Maternal smoking can result in miscarriages, premature delivery, and sudden infant death syndrome. Smoking during pregnancy nearly doubles a woman's risk of having a low birth weight baby, and low birth weight is a key predictor for infant mortality.



Of the counties measured the lowest value is 1.7% and the highest value is 24.7%. Barton County is doing pretty good at 77.2% but would like to get closer to the 96.4%.

Clara Barton Hospital Seeking Public Input on Local Health Needs

Over the next three months, Clara Barton Hospital will be partnering with the Barton County Health Department and other community health providers to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). The purpose of the assessment is to better understand the current health needs of residents in the Clara Barton service area and to help identify and prioritize where and how improvements can be made. The information and insight gained through the assessment will be used to guide new strategies and enhance existing efforts to improve the health of our community.

"This assessment is key in determining what health-related deficiencies our community considers a priority. Once we identify those challenges, we are then able to address and strategize how to overcome those issues in the future," said Jim Blackwell President/CEO of Clara Barton Hospital. "We want your opinion because once we know what concerns our community members have, we can then take the actions necessary within our means to improve it. We want to hear from everyone throughout our service area!"

Collecting resident's feedback is vital to ensure that the Community Health Needs Assessment is properly executed and makes the greatest possible impact to elevate our Communities health status.

"Our last Community Health Needs Assessment identified the need for better access to mental health services, outreach specialty providers, diabetic education, and the tools to fight obesity," said Blackwell. "We took that data and were able to add a Clinical Social Worker, Dietitian, Rheumatologist, and access to support groups and a variety of other specialists. Your opinion truly matters and the input we receive from this short survey provides us with the tools we need to continue to improve the healthcare available to our community."

The CHNA survey is now available throughout the Clara Barton service area. This questionnaire will take approximately 10 minutes to complete. It is anonymous and gives adults (18+) the opportunity to share concerns, to offer suggestions and to identify and prioritize what they feel is the most important health needs throughout the community.

Clara Barton Hospital and Clinics and its community partners are committed to working together with you to develop a strategic action plan for the upcoming years.
